Children's Centres see a surge in visitors

Children's Centres have seen a 25 per cent increase in the number of families passing through their doors between April and October 2011.

During the seven months following the service's restructure back in March, more than 7,800 individual families visited the borough's 13 centres compared to 5,821 during the same period the previous year.

In total, more than 50,500 visits have been made by families across the Children's Centre network between April and October 2011.

Children's Centres are open 8am to 6pm, 48 weeks a year, offering families with children under five a range of services, information and support in their local community as well as providing a safe and enjoyable atmosphere for children to play and learn.

Children's Centre programmes are based on the concept that providing integrated education, care, family support and health services are key factors in determining good outcomes for children and their families.

Winter response ready around the clock

Although the predicted cold snap failed to materialise over the festive season, the council's gritting crews were primed and ready to keep the borough's roads moving safely in the event of snow.

Following three consecutive severe winters, Barnet Council reinforced its winter response team ahead of the cold weather with nine new gritting vehicles and additional salt stocks.

Since the start of November, gritting crews have been out on a total of 31 days and made more than 197 individual gritting runs across the borough's road network, spreading a total of 580 tonnes of salt. An extra 117 tonnes of grit were also used to top up the borough's yellow grit bins.

In the past the council stocked 2,000 tonnes of salt each year, a level which was almost doubled to 3,804 tonnes this winter.

Each of the council's new trucks can hold up to nine tonnes of grit and boast state-of-the-art electronic tracking and monitoring systems which provide real time data on the location of the vehicles, the route followed and the amount of salt spread.

The new designs also allow for a more even spread of salt, including mechanisms for targeted spreading under parked vehicles where required.

Fraud investigators feature in BBC documentary

The work of Barnet Council's benefit fraud investigators has been highlighted in a BBC documentary.

Officers from the Corporate Anti-Fraud Team (CAFT) took part in filming for an episode of the BBC series 'Saints and Scroungers', which aired in mid-January, to explain their five-year investigation into a £112,000 benefit scam.

The investigation, codenamed Operation Avalanche, led to the conviction last July of four benefit cheats, three from the same family.

The culprits used multiple aliases and false indentities to fraudulently claim housing and council tax benefit before using it to finance the purchase of properties.

Riccardo Guthrie and his two sisters Bianca and Cosima Guthrie received jail terms ranging from three years to 18 months, while accomplice Courtney Campbell was handed a 12-month suspended sentence and 160 hours of community service for his part.

Confiscation proceedings are now underway to recover the illegally claimed money.

Barnet Council is reviewing how it presents information about how it is performing.

An 'Ideas Website', used for last year's budget consultation, has been adapted so residents can suggest what information they want about council services and how that information should be published.

Currently information published by the council varies in detail between an "Excellent" rating for the council's Children's Service and "percentage of managers submitting a monthly absence return" in Corporate Governance.

Residents can watch a short video on the site and then suggest what different information they would like published. They can then rate other residents' suggestions. The council is committed to reviewing all comments and where possible suggestions will be incorporated into a revised council website, due to go live later in the year.

Borough's newest primary school design revealed



Proposals have been put forward by Barnet Council to relocate and expand the existing Orion Primary School in Colindale to a new site, providing a purpose-built four-form entry school for the area.

As The Orion School currently shares a constrained site in Grahame Park with Blessed Dominic School, the proposals would also allow for future expansion of Blessed Dominic onto the vacated site.

The project is an important step in helping to ease the increasing demand for primary school places across Barnet, particularly in the west of the borough.

A planning application will be submitted and will be subject to comprehensive public consultation.





Our SATs results in top five nationally

arnet's schools have once again achieved a top five position nationally for Key Stage 2 exam results.

Last year 86 per cent of pupils in the borough's schools achieved level 4+ in English, with 84 per cent gaining the same grade in maths. This compares to 82 per cent in English and 81 per cent in maths nationally. 80 per cent of pupils achieved level 4+ in both English and maths compared to the national average of 74 per cent. In total, 89 per cent of pupils also met their expected progress in English from Key Stage 1 to 2, the fourth best in the country, while 88 per cent made their expected progress in maths, the third best score across the country.

Councillor Andrew Harper, Cabinet Member for Education, Children and Families, said: "With each set of exam results published, Barnet is firmly establishing itself as a borough that is providing a first class education to every pupil in every school.

"There is no better start in life than a good education and this is the reason why Barnet Council places such a great emphasis on its schools system.

"My congratulations go to all the hard working pupils and staff in their excellent achievements."

Driving services online

arnet motorists are now able to take advantage of a number of new online features making it quicker and easier to buy parking scratch cards, apply for a resident permit or order resident vouchers.

The improvements to the council's website also include an option to register for pay-by-phone parking and a search feature to find the nearest PayPoint outlet, a cash payment alternative to pay-by-phone parking.

In the event of receiving a Penalty Charge Notice (PCN), motorists will be able to view photographic evidence and challenge a fine online.

Since pay-by-phone parking was launched across the borough in 2009, more than 162,000 motorists have signed up.

Registering via the council's secure online website is now the easiest way to pay to park. Once registered, motorists can simply text their car registration number, the location number (displayed in all car parks) and the amount of time they'd like to park for. The relevant parking fee is then automatically deducted from a linked credit or debit card, with no need to carry the correct change. You can extend your parking by simply sending another text message.

Transactions are instantly loaded onto handheld devices used by local Civil Enforcement Officers.

Residents can also buy a one hour or 30 minute parking scratch card, costing £2 or £1 respectively, online as well as from all libraries across the borough.

New trading company set to offer greater choice for residents

arnet Council is to become one of the first local authorities in the country to launch a 'trading company' to help deliver some adult social services.

The move will see a Local Authority Trading Company (LATC) established with Barnet Homes, the organisation which manages the council's social housing. This is a key step as more disabled adults choose to receive direct payments which they can use, with the right support, to arrange and pay for the care they need.

While direct payments mean more control for residents over how their needs are met and where money is spent, they could not be used on services provided direct by the council.

That is why the council, with Barnet Homes, has set up Your Choice Barnet to manage these services and allow people to use direct payments on them. The LATC will be launched in February. It will be wholly owned by Barnet Council but will have its own board of directors and will manage its own operations.

The board of Your Choice Barnet will include experts by experience - disabled people and family carers - to make sure it is responsive to the needs of its customers.

The staff who will run the new LATC will be drawn from both the council and Barnet Homes.

Councillor Sachin Rajput, Cabinet Member for Adults, said: "This is an important change to the way the council gives a key group of our residents greater control over the services they receive and, by giving them that greater choice, empowers them to make decisions which will improve their care and support needs."

ail Laser laughs at the suggestion she is the Mary Portas of High Barnet. "Well I guess we do come from similar retail backgrounds," says Gail, chairman of High Barnet Traders
Association and the Barnet Town Team.

Using her experience in fashion retail and as a psychotherapist, Gail is clearly someone who understands what makes a business tick. And it's this acumen she's using to help breathe new life back into her high street.

Born and raised in Finchley, Gail moved to High Barnet 12 years ago with her husband Ronnie, and her now grown up children.

"We wanted more green space," says Gail. "There are good schools, you can walk to the supermarket and hop on the Tube into central London."

Wanting to help make High Barnet a better place, Gail joined the Barnet Society and soon became a committee member.

"I could see our high street was dying with traders feeling very downtrodden," she says.

Using her business nous and drive, Gail met with Barnet Council three years ago to discuss ways of reinvigorating the high street.

"We agreed to work together and develop a town centre strategy," she says.

In January 2011 the High Barnet Traders Association was formed and a Town Team founded in July 2011. The Team worked closely with Barnet Council and submitted a successful bid for £416,000 from the Mayor of London's Outer London Fund.

"We were delighted to receive the money and have been working hard using it to make a difference," says Gail. As well as decluttering and updating several shop fronts, the team are planting new trees making St. John the Baptist Church's garden a focal point. Some of the money has already been put to good use with a number of events helping draw more shoppers in.

"Things are starting to improve but it's a long process. People have to get behind their local traders, but local traders also have to help themselves.

"This is a golden opportunity for them to take stock and see what they can do differently," says Gail.

In her spare time, Gail likes to enjoy a cup of tea at Café Pacino. "They make delicious homemade cakes as well as great pasta," she says. She also loves taking her grandson to play in Courthouse Gardens and looks forward to showing him Barnet Museum.

She is keen to promote the excellent productions put on by students of Suzi Earnshaw at The Bull Theatre and enjoys shopping locally at The Present, Victoria Bakery and Butchers Hook.

"We all want a thriving high street, but we have to put our money where our mouths are and support our traders by shopping locally," Gail concludes.

*North Finchley and Cricklewood town centres are also set to receive a £3.7m boost to their high streets. The Mayor's Outer London Fund will provide £2.75m to create a Cultural Quarter in North Finchley and reinvigorate Cricklewood town centre.

arnet residents will be able to share in the excitement of the Olympics when the torch is carried through its streets this summer.

The borough is one of more than 1,000 villages, towns, cities and London boroughs announced by the London Organising Committee of the Olympic and Paralympic Games (LOCOG) through which the Olympic Flame will be carried by torchbearers during the London 2012 Olympic Torch Relay.

The exact route of the Olympic Flame will be announced in the next couple of months; it is expected to travel from Brent in the west of the borough on Wednesday 25 July and is anticipated to pass by Hendon Town Hall, through a number of town centres and by a number of parks before moving into Enfield in the east.

Working hours

Jo Wright is an Intensive Family Focus Officer within the council's Children's Service. Barnet is one of 16 national Family Intervention pilot projects funded by the Department for Communities and Local Government.

How would you describe the council's Family Intervention Project?

As the most effective way of supporting change, empowering families, and changing lives with very positive outcomes. It builds stronger communities whilst saving the public sector money.

What are the main aims of the Family Intervention project?

It's all about intensive family support, whether it's reducing crime and antisocial behaviour, helping develop parenting skills or co-ordinating various agencies who can also help. With all cases we aim to build a family's confidence and resilience to help them cope with future challenges.

What is the most challenging aspect of your role?

A It's probably getting a family to engage in the first place.

What drew you to becoming a Family Intervention Officer?

I was subject to a Police
Protection Order (PPO) at 11
months old and then a Child Protection

Plan before being adopted at the age of eight. My foster parents were the longest serving foster and adoptive parents of children with challenging behaviours and so I think that's why I now like being able to work with whole families in such a holistic way.

What's been the most rewarding aspect of your role?

Helping one parent find volunteering work and then a job was very rewarding. Also seeing a child's school attendance go from 38 per cent up to nearly 90 per cent was also a great achievement. It just shows how we've been able to empower them to take control of their own lives, which is just fantastic.

What are the most common situations you offer help with?

Reducing anti-social behaviour and crime, offering one-to-one parenting support, supporting families through difficult initial appointments and liaising with other services and professionals who can also offer the most common ways in which we can make a real difference.
