Guest column



As Barnet First is being prepared in the gap between the departure of Mike Freer and the election of a new council leader, I have been asked to write a few words of introduction to this magazine.

It is roughly six months since I arrived in Barnet as Borough Commander of Barnet Police and this is clearly a borough in which it has been and will continue to be a pleasure to serve. Barnet continues to have crime levels much lower than the London average. In part, I believe this is down to neighbours looking after each other, keeping an eye on property and checking up on anything suspicious.

Barnet's police and Barnet Council are working more and more closely together. We co-operate on a range of issues such as anti-social behaviour, binge drinking and noise pollution where joint initatives can achieve far more than either party can working alone.

This way of working has given us the sixth highest ranking in the Met Police area in public surveys of whether police are dealing with issues that really matter to the community.

But more important than just the police and the council working together is that the whole community pulls together to beat crime.

The one area where we are seeing a worrying rise in crime is in the burglary of homes, although this is from a relatively low starting point. Ever improving forensics means that we are now bringing offenders to justice at the earliest opportunity, but there is plenty of advice available on how you can reduce the risks of your home being burgled on the Barnet Police website (www.met.police.uk/barnet) or indeed in your local library. Please follow this advice and continue to look out for your neighbours.

Wishing you a prosperous, safe and crime-free New Year.

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Barnet's can recyclers help plant more trees in Africa

The number of trees planted in Malawi as part of an innovative arrangement between Barnet Council and Alupro has now passed 400.

The scheme sees not-for-profit company Alupro plant one tree for every tonne of cans collected by residents of the borough. The latest figures suggest that between July 2008 and June 2009 the council collected 258 tonnes of aluminium from residents, equating to 258 trees.

That follows the previous year's tally of 154 – bringing the total number now planted in the African state to 412. Barnet's contribution is part of a UK-wide project that has seen 250,000 trees planted by Alupro in two years.

The trees are a mixture of guava, paw paw, mango and orange, which will be used to help encourage new small businesses in the region.

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Snowdrop planting remembers child victims of the Holocaust

Children from Whitings Hill Primary School took part in the council's Snowdrop Project, which aims to plant a snowdrop in memory of every one of the 1.5 million children who died during the Holocaust.

This year's planting of 2,000 bulbs will take the total number of snowdrops planted throughout the borough to more than 29,000.

In previous years bulbs have been planted at the RAF Museum in Hendon, Friary Park, the Old Court House Recreation Ground and Brookfield Junior School.

Faster routes to independence

arnet resident Betty King lived an active life until she fell over and fractured her arm and a fairly simple operation led to her developing an infection. This took her close to death during a sixweek stay in hospital and left her highly dependent and unable to carry out simple day to day activities such as cooking and cleaning.

In years gone by, such a case would have seen care workers paying visits for months to cook, clean and generally 'look after' her. But now thanks to the popular council-run enablement service, people such as Mrs King are being helped to regain their independence faster.

Mrs King benefited from the service in April. The service enables users to relearn old skills, develop new skills, and receive treatments, such as physiotherapy, to start living independently again.

"I was so independent before my fall", said Mrs King, "So to suddenly have this disability was very frustrating. Support workers came in to help me for about six weeks and I had physiotherapy for eight weeks, but I'm glad I can now stand on my own two feet again and look after myself."

Mrs King is one of many Barnet residents that are helped through the enablement service.

Mill Hill County boy leads the way

rhan Deniz, 16, has been blind since birth. He chose, along with two other boys with a visual impairment in his year, to remain in mainstream schooling when entering secondary education.

Last summer Orhan gained nine GCSEs and is now studying four A levels at Mill Hill County sixth form. The other boys, James Sindole and Bilal Ansari also gained nine GCSEs each. Orhan's Head Teacher Geoffrey Thompson said: "The enrolment of three boys with a visual impairment was a greater undertaking than it might sound: every teacher had to develop methods to include students who couldn't see illustrations on the board. Although Mill Hill doesn't have a Visual Impairment Unit, resource officers from the council were able to operate specialist braille and text enlarging equipment on site to help with lessons and homework.

"The change from the nervous 11 year olds who clung on to staff, to the confident 16 year olds who moved about our site on their own, has been astonishing. The benefits of having Orhan and the other two boys in our school have been immense."

Orhan said: "When I first started, I was heavily reliant on staff, but over time I've become increasingly independent. It's been a real learning curve and I'm very proud of what I've achieved. I'm looking forward to being the first totally blind student to go into mainstream further education in Barnet."

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Celebrating Dollis Valley Green Walk

Over one third of Barnet is green space and Green Belt, giving residents the opportunity to enjoy the countryside on their doorstep.

There are plenty of green walks in the borough and the Dollis Valley Green Walk, shown here, is one of the most diverse. It is suitable for a wide range of people, from families with children to the more energetic.

Put on your walking boots and give it a go.

Totteridge Fields is managed by the London Wildlife Trust as a nature reserve, and is a rare example of a traditional lowland pastoral landscape. Look out for the rich mix of unusual grass, wildflowers and associated insects. The meadows attract thousands of butterflies, ensuring a colourful display throughout the summer.







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Mill Hill Viaduct's striking high arched brick structure soars high above the Dollis Brook. It was built in the early 1860s for the Great Northern Railway branch to Edgware and has a total of 13 arches. It now carries Tube trains on the Northern Line to Mill Hill East station.

Hampstead Heath was once a classic heath land habitat, containing plants such as heather and gorse, which has seen great changes over the years. Threatened by development in the early 19th century, an Act of Parliament in 1871 brought it into public ownership - one of the first purchased spaces for the use of everyone. Today it remains a popular and unique walk.

Council tackles housing eyesores

For years, number 73 was a blot on the landscape in Sunny Gardens Road. Left empty, it had fallen into a sorry state.

"I remember when I first saw the house. It smelt old and rotten, and I don't think it had been painted or decorated for the best part of 30 years," Prakash Tanna, the property's new owner explains. "The wiring was dating back 70 years, there was no central heating, the floors creaked and it was the kind of house that sends shivers down your spine."

Prakash spotted the derelict property while living locally, and decided it would make an interesting refurbishment project. But with the recession taking hold it was difficult to make the numbers add up.

He was delighted to learn he qualified for an empty homes grant from Barnet Council, providing financial support to landlords who are bringing long-term empty properties back into residential use.

"It was like a lifeline," Prakash says. "It was a golden opportunity for me to bring the property back into use and to make a difference to the area."

Since the start of the scheme's launch in 2008, Barnet Council has helped to bring 37 previously disused properties like Sunny Gardens Road back into residential use across the borough through a combination of advice, grants and enforcement action where necessary.

As the fencing came down around the once derelict property to reveal its new identity, Prakash noticed his neighbours had started to spruce their houses up on the street.



"It was a bit of a knock-on effect really. Before you knew it three or four houses had been painted along the stretch and the whole road had been improved," he says with a sense of pride.

The scheme targets properties which have remained unoccupied for a considerable period of time, making them possible magnets for anti-social behaviour or other crime-related activities.

By removing these properties, the scheme has had the double benefit of reducing this kind of behaviour and improving the overall attractiveness of the street.

Once the work was complete, Prakash offered the two newly-created flats to tenants on the council's housing waiting list.

Mark Brown and his family were one of the lucky ones who moved in.

"It's very well decorated, everything is brand new and the rooms are a good size," Mark says standing in his newly fitted kitchen. "It's much better than the other properties we looked at."









Not just a load of old rubbish

ver wondered where your recycling ends up?

Below you can find out exactly where all

Barnet's collected materials are sent, how far they travel and what they are turned into...

Paper is taken to Aylesford in Kent, the largest paper recycling plant in the UK which produces 500,000 miles of newsprint every year. National newspapers such as The Sun and The Times along with Barnet's local papers are sometimes produced using Aylesford's paper.

Cardboard is taken to Smurfit Kappa in Kent. Here it is made into 'Kraft' - the thick, brown packing paper which normally lines the inside of cardboard boxes.

Glass goes to O-I Manufacturing (UK) Ltd in Harlow, where it is turned back into glass bottles and jars. These are then sold to companies who bottle major drink brands such as Gordon's Gin and Stella Artois.

Plastic bottles are taken to JayPlas on Merseyside where they are sorted into the different types of plastics. These are then granulated and turned in to new plastic products such as water pipes.

Tin cans, foil and aerosols are transported to the AMG steel plant in Llanelli, South Wales.

Steel cans are melted down to make new products such as car parts, steel girders or other building material.

Aluminium is transported to Novelis in Warrington where they are shredded, melted and re-cast as cans.

Commemoration to mark the Holocaust

very year the council marks Holocaust Memorial Day by inviting all residents to attend a special service to mourn those who lost their lives through genocide.

For almost a decade, Barnet's Mayor has led a civic procession to Hendon where a range of special guests have spoken about their experiences to an audience of over 500.


Past speakers have included Major Dick Williams, who helped to liberate Belsen concentration camp; Jack Kagan, a Belorussian Jew who suffered at the hands of the Nazis, and the Ambassador of the Republic of Rwanda, Mr Claver Gatetehave.

In 2007, as well as holding a service, the council arranged for the critically acclaimed 6 Million + art installation to be displayed at Brent Cross Shopping Centre. Made up of more than six million buttons to commemorate the victims of the Holocaust, it evoked strong emotions in visitors - some of whom had lost friends and family during the horrors of World War II – and attracted thousands of people from across London.

At this year's service, Denise Affonco, author of The End Of Hell* will talk about her sufferings under the Khmer Rouge. Henry Grunwald, Vice Chairman of the Holocaust Memorial Trust, will also be talking about creating tolerance and understanding between different religions.

The service is being held on 24 January from 1pm at the Ricketts Quadrangle in The Burroughs, Hendon. All residents are invited to attend and pay homage to all those that have suffered and are still suffering from crimes against humanity.

Neva Ward, 60, is the kitchen manager at Friern Barnet Primary School and has worked as a school dinner lady for 32 years. She lives in Cockfosters, Barnet.

Describe your main responsibilities?

Making sure we're working to the menus provided for us by the Head of Catering and ensuring the children are fed and happy.

What's the best and worst part of your job?

The best is hearing the children describe our roast dinners as 'wicked'. The worst is telling my staff off for going too slow. We only have 40 minutes to feed 500 children and 50 staff.

What has changed in school dinners over the last 10 years?

A 10 years ago it was chips, chips and more chips. Now chips are a dirty word, our menus are nutritionally balanced and all our food is made from scratch. My clothes no longer smell of cooking oil and the deep fat fryer has been relegated to the bin.

Have you seen a big change in children's tastes?

A Most children were horrified when we first banned chips.

They threw their arms in the air, stamped their feet and said 'oh my god I'm going to starve'. When they realised it was healthy food or nothing they gave in and started to eat their greens.

What's your most popular dish?

A The children love our spaghetti bolognaise, home made pot noodles, chocolate muffins and sponge and custard.

What gives you your greatest job satisfaction?

A Seeing a gleaming counter filled with piping hot food at the start of service, and a pile of empty plates at the end.

Who would you invite to a dinner party?

Jamie Oliver – he's my hero.

What's the funniest thing that's happened to you during work?

A Lifting the lid off a liquidiser too soon and getting covered from head to toe in tomato sauce.
